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HOMEWORK AT XAVIER CHARTER SCHOOL

I want to take a few minutes to address the issue of homework at Xavier Charter School. From time to time I have students and parents come to me to address the issue of students having too much homework. This is a multi-faceted topic that requires some thought and explanation.

I will begin by saying that I think students can have too much homework. Every one of us does or should have a life outside of the daily commitments of our jobs or, and in this case, school. Family meals, extra-curricular activities, vacations, and leisure are all parts of our lives that deserve more than just a nod of consideration. Americans are often characterized as living to work rather than working to live. We have very little interest in padding resumes, creating busywork, and wasting precious time. The sort of stress induced existence created by a life where work or school consume most of your waking hours is not the aim of our school nor should it be. All that being said, we will always be willing to evaluate the amount and quality of work we send home with children and change course should we veer from the goals and purposes we have created as an institution. That is our promise to our community.

We must also mention, first and foremost, that Xavier is a Classical Liberal Arts School and with that comes a devotion to intellectual study and Socratic Discussion. Our Rhetoric School students are reading and studying the likes of Shakespeare, Euclid, Melville, and Voltaire et cetera. This simply takes time and patience. There is no shortcut. We simply do not have the time, especially on the secondary level, to spend a good portion of our classes reading the works we discuss. Class time is devoted to Socratic Discussion and practicing necessary skillsets in the various disciplines. That is our model and for that we will not apologize. This can, at times, be overwhelming to students. The reading is difficult. The language can be obscure. The math practice is just that. Practice. And with practice comes failure and hopefully a willingness to try again which again takes time. Sometimes the work can seem boring and to be frank reading and intellectual pursuit are not nearly as exciting as a movie or a video game, especially to the novice. But, that doesn't make the work not worth doing. Aldous Huxley, the renowned author of the dystopian fiction Brave New World once said, "The most valuable of all education is the ability to make yourself do the thing you have to do, when it has to be done, whether you like it or not." Intellectual pursuit is very similar to preparing for battle and preparing for battle can be, but usually is not, fun. We all know however that if a soldier goes to battle without being conditioned, without firing his or her weapon, or without learning to use the equipment necessary to survive, the consequences can be fatal. And again, there is no shortcut. But, if, they are willing to take the hard road, to push themselves, to pursue knowledge and wisdom, and finally virtue, your children will be more free. They will be free to design their lives and lead others to success along the way. They will be free to challenge systems that cage that success. They will be free to be participants in their own destiny, to mold circumstances around the ideals of the common good when it is possible and to adapt themselves to situations when they are unmovable. They will be free, finally, to lead lives of purpose. If that isn't worth pursuing, I don't know what is.
